Implementation of New Immunization Requirements

Medically Verified Records – School Module Adoption

- Spring, 2018 Seattle School District
 - With School Module, schools with high free lunch rates INCREASE immunization compliance.
 - The CIS is a barrier to student access
- Spring, 2018 RSD decides to transition to School Module
- November, 2018 School Module training for nurses
- January, 2019 RSD starts using School Module
- January, 2019 Measles outbreak
 - Focus switches to MMR compliance and communication about exemptions

Medically Verified Records

- Implementing School Module
- March, 2019 Focus on getting complete records in School Module
 - Both dates and exemptions
- June and August, 2019
 - Focus on compliance and complete records
 - Immunization clinics with HealthPoint
 - School Module
 - Improved accuracy of vaccines administered and decreased vaccines omitted
 - MyIR
 - Laptop set up for registration with nurses nearby for assistance
- October, 2019
 - Medically verified records for all students

Communication Strategies – Families

- School Module Letters
 - Translations multiple languages on a single page
 - Altered messaging from "Provide the school with medically verified dates" to "Ask your provider to update WAIIS"
 - Nurse capacity issue
 - Access to complete records
 - Time
 - Understanding of immunizations
- District and school level mailings
- Phone calls
 - Permission to Share versus Permission to Enter
- Emails
 - Excel from School Module allows us to send general emails through the student Information System

Tdap Implementation

- Transition timing is perfect with coronavirus outbreak
- High priority focus on current 6th graders who need Tdap 10 or older
- Changed messaging to include Tdap, HPV, MCV and flu
 - Monthly Happy Birthday emails
- Paused communication with 5th graders during school closure to focus on fall 2020 required immunizations

Conditional Status – Staff Communication

• February, 2020

- Training for office managers and principals
 - Understanding the changes
 - Understanding the COE
 - Exclusions are state law for principal
- Immunizations are a TEAM SPORT
- Shifted tone about immunizations from it's the nurses' job to it's our job

Conditional Status – Parent Communication

- March, 2020 Pandemic
 - Communication stopped about immunizations
 - In-person registration stopped
- May, 2020
 - Principals communicate a "soft" message about immunization importance
- June, July, August, 2020
 - Communication targeted to out of compliance students
 - Hopefully immunization clinics

Return to School

- Nurses are committed to fully compliant students when school reopens
 - Protecting community health
 - Preserving the gains made in compliance
