

COVID-19 VACCINES FOR ADOLESCENTS: What it means for providers

On May 10, 2021 the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued an Emergency Authorization (EUA) for use of the Pfizer-BIONTech COVID-19 vaccine for 12–15-year-olds. This includes simultaneous administration of COVID-19 and other vaccines on the same day.

More than <u>3.8 million children have been infected with COVID-19</u> since the beginning of the pandemic. We encourage you to do your part to make sure adolescents ages 12 and up get immunized against COVID-19 and receive all other vaccinations they are eligible for.

Enrolling in the COVID-19 Vaccination Program

- In order to administer COVID-19 vaccinations, you must <u>enroll in the</u> federal COVID-19 Vaccination Program.
- Use the <u>COVID-19 Vaccination Program</u> <u>Provider Preparation Checklist</u>.
- Use the <u>COVID-19 Provider Enrollment</u> <u>Guide</u> to help you through the enrollment process.

Raising Awareness about COVID-19 Vaccine

- Contact eligible patients and schedule first and second dose appointments for their Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine!
- If you are not enrolled in the COVID-19 Vaccination Program, refer patients to <u>another location</u> that provides the vaccine.
- Review the American Academy of Pediatrics' <u>FAQs about COVID-19</u> <u>vaccines</u> and recommendations on <u>how</u> <u>to prepare for, how to implement</u>, and <u>how to get paid</u> for COVID-19 vaccine administration in pediatric practices.
- Review DOH materials on <u>communicating</u> <u>about mRNA vaccines</u>.

Catching-up Children on All Vaccinations

- Use your EMR patient portal, email, phone calls or texts to target outreach.
- Contact patients due for well-child visits associated with shots (0-2, 4-5, 9-11 and 16-18 years).
- The COVID-19 vaccine for 12-yearolds and older can be administered on the same day as adolescent routine vaccinations.
- Send <u>reminder/recall</u> notifications for routine immunizations that include information about COVID-19 vaccinations.
- Generate your clinic's <u>coverage rate</u> <u>report</u> in the WA IIS.
- Include information on your website and in social media about the importance of routine immunizations during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- If available in your region, partner with <u>school-based health centers</u> to expand access to routine childhood vaccines.
- Encourage patients to use <u>MyIR</u> to check their immunization status.
